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



WHY CONTINUE THE COHORT STUDY?

- Need to continue to understand the long-term impact of military service and deployment
- The POWER in longitudinal data
- Growing veteran group may have changing needs and experiences through transition and civvy life
- Evidence to continue to support voluntary sector and government policy and service delivery

KCMHR Health and wellbeing study of serving and ex-serving UK Armed Forces personnel – PHASE 4




 Fourth phase of a cohort study examining the mental health and wellbeing of UK Armed Forces personnel (serving and ex-service), regulars and reserves.


AIMS

- To DETERMINE any mental health or wellbeing effects that have emerged since phases 1, 2 and 3
- To DESCRIBE participants' mental health and wellbeing journeys (trajectories) over the course of the previous phases to now

POTENTIAL PARTICIPANTS

- Those who responded at phase 3 of the KCMHR health and wellbeing study (2014– 2016) and consented to being recontacted (n ≈ 8,500).
- Majority have deployed to Iraq (Op TELIC) or Afghanistan (Op HERRICK)
- Transition to an ex-serving (veteran) cohort
- Estimated average age: 45 years old (currently)





□ Ex-Service □ Service personnel

DATA COLLECTION

- Specific invite by email or letter to complete a self-report online or paper questionnaire
- Possibility of base visits and questionnaire sessions where service personnel eligible for the study are co-located
- Data collection Jan 2022-July 2023



 Social media and intensive tracing activities to find people where contacts are out of date

TOPIC AREAS


1. Demographic and military background (relationship status, education, rank, deployments)

- **2. Health and wellbeing** (help-seeking, mental health problems, mTBI, alcohol, smoking, suicidality)
- **3. Socio-economic** (current employment, benefits receipt, job satisfaction, accommodation, finances)
- **4. Families, relationships and social activities** (marital satisfaction, impact of service on children and relationships, domestic violence/IPV, social support)

POTENTIAL IMPACT AND INFLUENCE

Update on the current health and wellbeing of cohort members and longitudinal data which can inform:

Welfare/support/healthcare service provision for the UK Armed Forces (serving and exservice)

- Identifying current needs and indicating trends
- Targeting funds and specific services
- Influencing interventions and healthcare provision

Policy

- Influence national and local government policy and decision making
- i.e., identifying key issues/areas that need support

Research

• Identify key issues, gaps, recommendations for future research

POTENTIAL OPPORTUNITIES

Scope for data linkage (e.g., health records, criminal records)

Scope for qualitative studies and additional quantitative studies tied to the cohort Benefit of the cohort is that it creates the basis for impact much larger than the sum of its parts!
